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imported by members of Altar Guild III, have hung in the old St. Raphael's these past ten years. Because of their origin and artistic quality it was decided to use these Stations in the new Sanctuary.

Immediately to the west of the Sanctuary is the chapel where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved. This chapel will be used for daily Eucharist as well as for small weddings and funerals and other more intimate celebrations. This chapel, which seats 50, will also be the rehearsal room for the church choirs.

In the area between the chapel and the atrium we find the work rooms of the community. These facilities include a vestry, an altar servers sacristy, a work sacristy and an ushers room. In this area, there are also appropriate public restrooms. All of the electrical, heating and air conditioning equipment is located in the large basement below the atrium.

This four year ADVENTURE IN BUILDING CHURCH is now bearing fruit because of the dedicated labor of so many.

From the many planning sessions of the Building Committee, through the fund raising efforts, through the construction process, and now this dedication.

John Bezek, Pat Cawiezell and Barbara Goodmon led the initial Development Fund drives and this work has been sustained by the dedicated efforts of Ken Horn. Steve Kostecke has been the parish representative throughout the construction process.

Albert Ruocchio, with the assistance of his sons, Paul and Peter, designed and installed the sound system.

The Dedication Committee with Ed and Pat Cody at the helm planned the week of dedication activities.

The St. Raphael Altar Guild, our four choirs, the Parish Staff and Ministry Team, in fact, the entire Parish Family has cooperated in every way.—

all in support of the untiring efforts of our pastor, Father Lewis.
